Part A SET IT UP



Step 1 PRETEACH VOCABULARY

Give the students the handout and go over the vocabulary.

INTRODUCE THE VIDEO

Ask the students how they would feel if their smartphone were hacked into. Tell them the rest of the video is about informing the volunteers of what happened and talks a little more about the situation.

What do companies do with all that data they can get from our cellphones?

Play section and elicit answers. They collect more data than they need so they can sell it (name, playing habits, location, etc) to advertising networks. With more personal information, those developers can collect a higher price tag (charge more) to anyone who wants to buy it.
